

In the midst of all the childhood pain, however, Dallas met a God he came to believe was the most joyous being in the universe, and nothing bad should ever be spoken or thought of Him.

#### What have I done?

Jane Lakes of Sparta, Georgia.

Like Dallas, Jane's home life was disrupted by separation. Jane was born in a room of the boarding house owned by her maternal grandparents.

She thrived in the local youth group of her church.

In the summer of 1951, she went off to Tennessee Temple. On her first night, "I remember going to sleep thinking, 'What have I done?' But after attending the first chapel service, 'I'm home.'"

18 months later, Dallas arrived.

# From Migrant Worker to College Student

Dallas spent much of his first year after High School as a migrant agricultural worker by day and self-taught student at night—reading Plato and Kipling after the sun went down.

Then roofing...then William Jewel College...then roofing.

Then Dallas began to preach.

Memories of 18 year old Dallas standing on the back of a pickup truck with a stream of words pouring forth from his mouth in rapid-fire deliver.

"I was a real whiz-ban preacher." (54-55)



# A Big Brother's Push

In late Fall, 1953, J.I. again urged Dallas to deeper study. This time he suggested Tennessee Temple.

Winter semester, 1954, Dallas got sick and returned home to Missouri. As soon as Dallas began to recover, he was sent back to the Tennessee hills.

#### Can't Afford Socks but Rich in Voice

Jane, "His wonderful voice left an impression on me.

Nothing really clicked for me until...

I heard him sing that afternoon."

#### SETTING PEOPLE'S HAIR ON FIRE

Not only did Jane keep wearing angora sweaters, but she also had a flannel graph and knew how to use it. (58)

- They participated in student-led evangelistic activities.
- Local jails, street meetings, Good News Club
- In front of the bars of Chattanooga "She would play the pump organ, and I would sing & preach."

Dallas remembers being taught to preach in a judgmental or condemnatory spirit.

"I thought you preached by setting people's hair on fire."

Jane said, "Dallas was different. He always sounded real. His heart was there and he was smart, a thinker."



# But he started writing poetry to me...

"Well, it could have been nice. I didn't want to think that way all the time. Maybe I wasn't equal to the task of marrying someone who thought like that."

Then the influence of the pink 'sweetheart flavor' ice cream.

"Let's go steady. I have never loved anyone like I love you."





#### I WENT INTO A FOG

Chapel Preachers John R. Rice & R.R. Brown "Giants in the land."

After failing his class on Romans, Dallas cheated on the exam when he took the class a 2nd time. He confessed it to his teacher then went to a revival

As R.R. Brown prayed over Dallas, he had a deep experience with the vivid presence of God.

"It never really left me. After that, I never had the feeling that God was distant or had a problem hearing me."

"I was in a conversational relationship with Him."

#### "BECOMING DALLAS WILLARD" - CH. 5

At Tennessee Temple, Dallas experienced God personally. He came to believe that ordinary Christians could have deeper experiences of God in their day-to-day lives.

When it comes to spiritual practices...

"one must not be agitated, hurried, or exhausted...one cannot tack effective, life-transforming practice of prayer and study onto 'life as usual'."

He maintained a deep love for and a high view of Scripture.
