





"I took the job at USC for the lighter teaching load. What USC offered would be more conducive to the writing I knew I wanted to do."

"We learned a lot about LA from hearing the Johnny Carson Show on the neighbor's TV."



# Dallas came very close to being rejected by USC.

# In memory of Dallas Willard

September 4, 1935 - May 8, 2013

Beloved Professor of Philosophy (1965-2012)

"You cannot 'opt out' of having a worldview.
You can only try to have one that most accords with reality, including the whole realm of facts concerning what is genuinely good.
The four questions any worldview must answer are:

What is reality?
Who is well-off?
Who is truly a good person?
How does one become a truly good person?

### Opposing 20th Century Approaches of Philosophy


Analytic vs. Continental

Early 20th Century = Natural Sciences

Softer Sciences - Become 'scientific' or be marginalized by the scientific naturalism coming to dominate Western culture and its institutions.

"Immediate Experience"
Obscure Subjectivity vs. Logical Objectivity

Re-enter Edmund Husserl - Experience can secure the "objectivity of knowledge".



USC was shifting toward Analytic Philosophy. Knowledge and Goodness were about to go through a painful divorce.

# Chapter 8 - "Early Years at USC"

Dallas often lectured while smoking rum soaked cigars.

He kept this a secret from Jane until he forgot himself once while standing in line with her at the grocery store, and, being a professor, he absent-mindedly tossed a pack in their cart.



Dallas never mentioned his religious convictions in the classroom. But for those who knew what they were looking for, especially during his early days at USC, "the preacher" would sometimes slip in. (120)

Dallas was "warm, caring and avuncular." (121)

"Do you believe in God?" a student asked.

Dallas said, "Well, if I told you, what would you know then that you don't know now that would help you know what to believe?"

He was down-to-earth and free of BS. He often used three cows: Bessie, Bossy & Buttercup.

Philosophy would help students "find a basis in knowledge for action."

Dallas' heart was like a homing device for those who were experiencing deep pain and suffering.

Dallas moved to LA but brought his heritage with him.

He was at home in the hills and with his friends like Plato, Aristotle and Aquinas.

For Dallas, the notion of knowledge and reality are limited to the measurable and visible world was the single, most destructive idea in existence.

Wise and compassinate, he seemed to have all the answers and a heart that gravitated to those experiencing pain.

"The students are so honoring and accepting, we feel like the King & Queen."

1967 - National Danforth Associate

1976 - Blue Key National Honor Fraternity's "Outstanding Faculty Member"

1976-1977 - USC Associates Award "Excellence in Teaching"

1982-1985 - Philosophy Department Chair

1984 - USC Student Senate "Outstanding Faculty Member of the Year"

"The professor must answer the question, 'What good am I doing for the student as a total person with this course?' He must then make the answer to this question clear to his student."



# Chapter 9 - "King and Queen of Campus"

Like Husserl, Dallas believed it is possible to have direct experience with a mind independent world that transcends barriers of language, culture, time, and even visibility. But not all of his colleagues in the department would agree.

"It is what we assume to be real and valuable that governs our attitudes and actions."

Dallas had concern about what is good, beautiful and true and big questions addressed by Plato, Aristotle, Aquinas, Kant...the genuinely enduring questions.

Chapter 9 - "King and Queen of Campus"

He was drawn to proving that invisible things, like the Kingdom of Heaven, are out there and are real (metaphysical realism), and they can be grasped, stepped into, and interacted with, and learned from as they really are (epistemic realism.)

"Do you think Jesus can walk up to you?"

"When you pray, Jesus will walk right up to you and he will listen to you." Dallas Willard

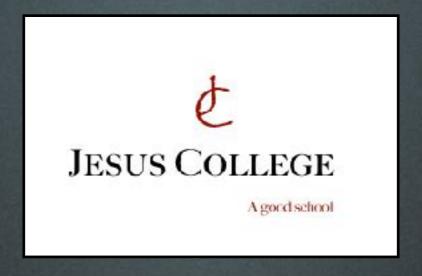
